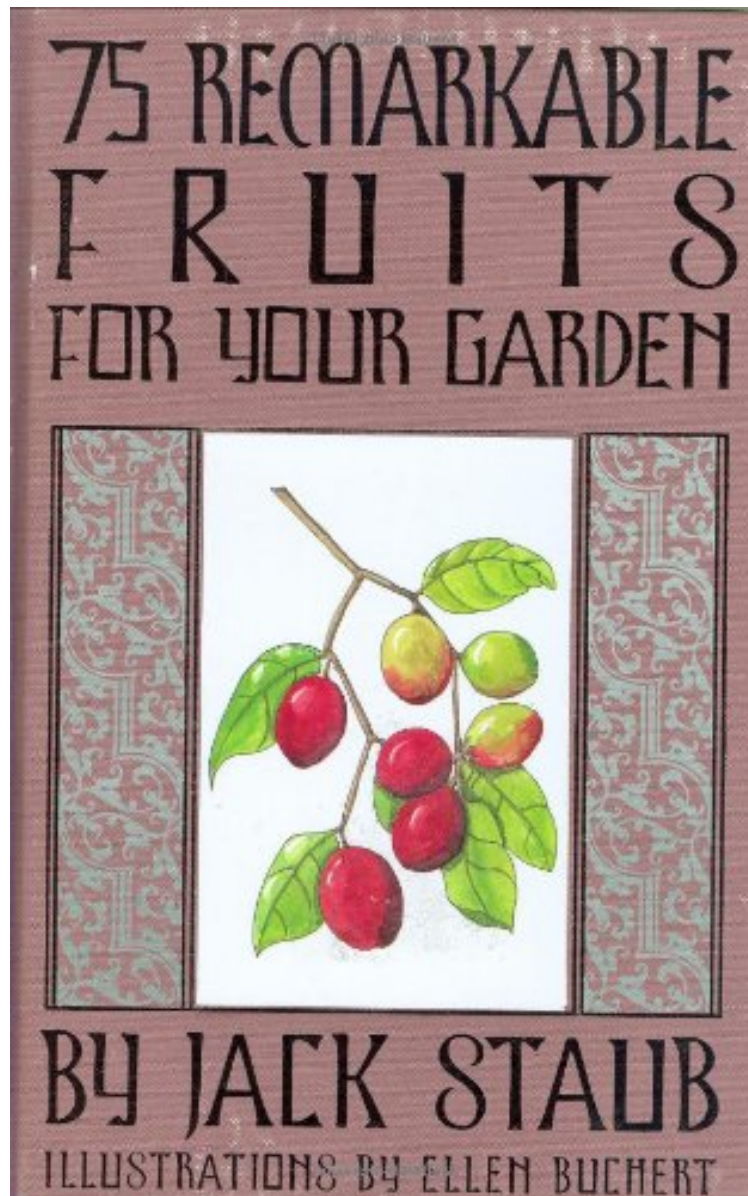

backyard/indoor planting. That being said, the book's purpose stops there. Alas, it is called "75 Remarkable Fruits for Your Garden" and nothing more. If Jack Staub had added "And How to Grow/Maintain Them" in the title, I would have been vastly disappointed. Each fruit is covered in a few pages (usually 1 to 3), including illustrations by Ellen Buchert, brief historical synopses, some short recommended recipes, sometimes a zone description, and/or interesting information the author found upon researching the fruits further. You won't find anywhere in this book a detailed description on how to cultivate the plants, required growing conditions, fruit tree pests/diseases, or anything of the like. Rather, this book serves as an inspirational purpose to spur the reader into further research on the plants provided. The author himself states, in the introduction, that he himself has only cultivated a handful of the varieties described, and that the information he found is owed largely to reading other books and browsing the internet. Nonetheless, the book is well-written and enjoyable. I have found myself interested in the cultivars described and intend on trying my hand at growing some.
